Minister's Letter

Dear Friends



As this is the first issue of *Connections* for 2017 let me begin by wishing you every blessing for this year. I would also like to thank everyone for the support which they gave to the various appeals which we ran over Advent and Christmas. The generosity with which you supported, not only our annual Christian Aid Advent Appeal, but also the appeal for gifts of food for those living on the streets of our city and the annual Gift Service, is much appreciated by all the recipients. Thanks also to those who attended to the practicalities surrounding these appeals.

At our service on New Year's Day we were reflecting on the things that we need to let go at the beginning of a New Year, as well as those we need to take up. As you will read elsewhere in this newsletter, the Kirk Session are currently giving consideration to the provisions we make for the Sacrament of Communion.

Sometimes circumstances require Session

to take immediate decisions but these are always given serious consideration first. Sometimes we have the luxury of taking our time with decision-making. We are currently seeking your views over possible changes in the number and timing of our quarterly Communion services. Please avail yourself of this opportunity and speak to your district elder at their next visit or contact our Session Clerk. We want to hear what you think.

In the Church of Scotland, the Kirk Session is the body of elders which carries the responsibility for the spiritual welfare of the congregation. Recently Greenbank Session has been seeking to appoint new elders. We are excited that a number have accepted the call to serve God in this way. The service of ordination will be held on 12th February and I hope you will be able to join in the celebration of worship on that day. Please also remember these new elders in your prayers, and continue to give thanks and pray for all who have offered many years of dedicated and faithful service on Session and still continue to do so.

As I write this letter I am preparing to leave for Pittsburgh for the final taught school of the Doctorate of Ministry. This will be followed by an organised elective in the Netherlands at the end of February/beginning of March where we will meet with congregations and reflect on the ways in which the church there is responding to the challenges presented by the increasingly secular nature of society. There is still a project to be carried out before the Doctorate is completed but I am very grateful for having had the opportunity to study in this way. In particular I'm grateful to our Associate, Rev Peter Graham, for providing pastoral cover and

leading worship during my study leave.

Last but not least, a warm welcome to our new youth associate, Steve Chaffee, who started work with us part-time in December. Once his visa comes through, which we hope will be soon, Steve's post will become full-time. I'm sure that you will all make him very welcome and we pray for him and look forward to his contribution to the life and work of Greenbank.

Greenbank's "Reverse Advent Calendar"

This Christmas saw the first **Greenbank Reverse Advent Calendar**, an initiative by the Mission and Service Committee, following a great suggestion by David Allan.

The idea was that instead of taking chocolates from an advent calendar, it would be good during Advent to give something to those less fortunate than ourselves.

We asked people during Advent to bring non-perishable food items to church which we could take to the three homeless organisations which we already support throughout the year – Streetwork in the Cowgate, St Catherine's Convent and Foursquare (supported accommodation for young people). We also helped Richmond Craigmillar's Fareshare project.

We hoped that we would be able to give reasonable donations to each one. We need not



have worried! Richard and I emptied the two hampers of donated food from the church vestibule several times each week to take to

the four organisations. After 50 sackloads, we stopped counting! We estimate that over 1,000 items of food worth well over £1,000 were donated. The appeal was supported not only by the congregation, but also by many of our friends who use the halls throughout each week, not forgetting our pre-school who made a great contribution.

This was a MASSIVE success, and the four organisations pass on their gratitude to all who helped. Thank you all, and don't forget that the food box is at the door of the church every Sunday to receive your contributions of food for the homeless.

Our New Youth Assistant – Steve Chaffee

Steve was born and brought up “on a sandbank” off the coast of New Jersey. He has an older brother. His father is a realtor (estate agent). He was brought up in the Lutheran Church.



After local High School he attended Eastern University in Pennsylvania (private, Baptist), graduating with a degree in Theology. He won a scholarship to nearby Villanova University, a Catholic institution built round an Augustinian monastery. During his studies he became interested in systematic theology and in particular in the work of Thomas F. Torrance. Professor Torrance is best known for his pioneering work in the study of science and theology, but is equally respected for his work in sys-

tematic theology. He taught at New College, Edinburgh for many years, and this was one reason why Steve enrolled in the MSc in Science and Religion course there. He is a copy-editor with the *T F Torrance Theological Fellowship*.

Edinburgh holds other attractions for Steve. He is keen on Okinawan Martial

Arts, and there is an active group here. In addition he has always been interested in the theory and practice of games – a wide variety of board games as well as online games such as Minecraft and Dungeons and Dragons. There is an active and growing interest in game-playing in Edinburgh, which Steve will enjoy. He sees games as a way for people of a wide age range to get together; perhaps there will be more game-playing at Greenbank!

Steve’s girlfriend is a recently qualified vet, who is currently working in Dover.

Eco-Column – Registered for Going Green in 2017

Readers may have noticed that we now appear on the Eco-Congregation Scotland website as a registered congregation! Our ambition this year is to make significant progress on our developing agenda in this area, and this includes action and involvement from everyone – even in small ways. Registration means that the convenor of the Green Group, John Ferguson, will be our lead contact, becoming at the same time a trustee of the national body. We will get help in the form of resources and advice, and benefit from the support of a mentor as well.

Being part of the eco-congregation movement means that we all have an obligation to make a contribution to saving the world's resources, and assisting in 'caring for creation'. Top tips for domestic action include the old chestnut of turning down the room thermostat on the central heating, but also changing light bulbs to LED versions where possible, just as we have in church. Other good moves are to make sure washing machines

are running wash programmes at low heat settings (30°C) and looking carefully at hot water consumption generally.

The Green Group is meeting now to prioritise actions in the coming months and so comments and ideas from anyone interested, as well as offers of help to implement practical tasks in the church premises, will be welcome.

If you want to get into campaigning on the key issues, a good starting point is Christian Aid's 'Big Shift' initiative, designed to lobby the big banks to retreat from investment in fossil fuel industries. Kirk Session News

Some Changes to Communion Arrangements

Communion is a really important part of our worship at Greenbank, as it is for Christians everywhere, and we have recently been thinking about whether our Communion services should be changed in any way, to reflect today's circumstances.

One change has already been made. Since last October, there has been an informal celebration of Communion after the 10.30am service on the last Sunday of every month. These more frequent services are proving popular and will continue throughout this year. The common cup and individual glasses are available. Please think of staying back after the end of the service to take part.

On the other hand, at its meeting on 10th January, the Kirk Session decided to discontinue the pre-communion services held on the Friday as a preparation for the quarterly Communions. These had been linked to the Kirk Session meetings, when elders used to get their duties for the Sunday. The duties are now circulated by email and the meetings are no longer held. The numbers attending the services have declined to single figures so it has been decided to stop holding them from now on. The Kirk Session has also had a preliminary discussion about the number and

timings of the main Communion services, including whether to combine the two morning services into a single service at 10.30am, or to hold the 9am service in the Braid Room, or to make no changes. The 3pm Communion service, held in the Braid Room, would continue unchanged. The Session would like to hear what members think. So, if you have views, please speak to your elder at the time of the March Communion or email the Session Clerk at

Finally, I wish to record the Kirk Session's thanks to Muriel McLardy and her team of helpers who have laundered and maintained our Communion pew cloths over the years. But their numbers are shrinking and there are many other calls on people's time. We are very grateful for the efforts of the team over many years.

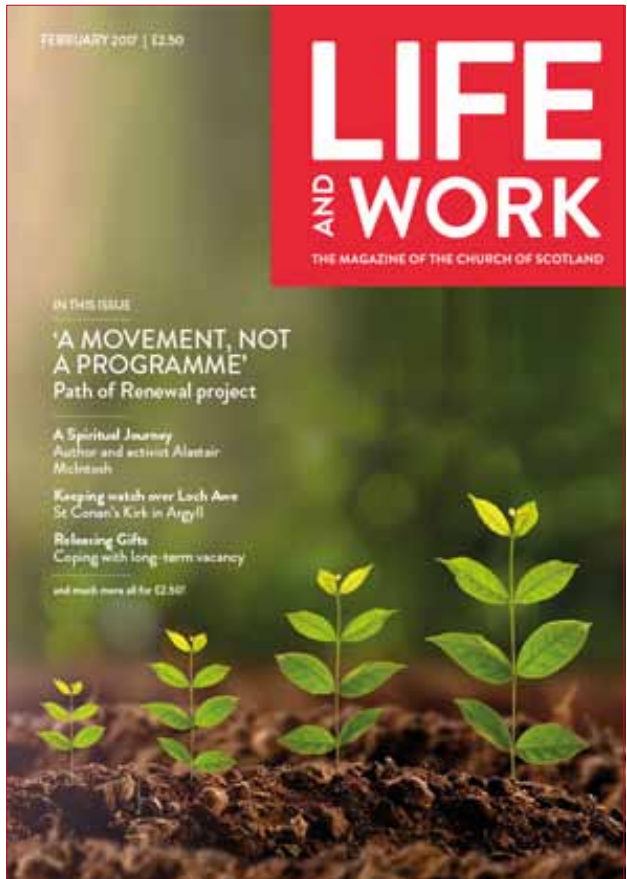
