Minister's Letter

Dear Friends



I'm writing this on Remembrance Sunday and thinking that it can't be time for Christmas already, but planning has to go on, and the copy deadline for the December/January issue of *Connections* has to be met!

I'm a big fan of Advent and Christmas, and an even bigger fan of enjoying both as distinctive seasons. The delayed gratification of focusing on the reflective Advent mood of quiet anticipation, and then exploding into Christmas has always been one of my favourite seasonal shifts. Of course, you can't be too purist about it all, as there are parties, concerts, and nativity plays to enjoy throughout December, but one of my favourite experiences was to sit in Durham Cathedral for a peaceful service of Choral Evensong on 23rd December a few years ago, whilst the rest of the world seemed to be going crazy and stressed-out on festivities!

In the midst of all of the fun, Christ slips into the world. The story of the stable may owe more to piety than history, but the idea is right. God is born and virtually nobody notices. Our mission for Advent

and Christmas at Greenbank is to make sure that people **do** notice, and that the story speaks freshly into their experience today. An old song, but with a new spin for today's context.

I hope that many of you will take the chance to be part of our Advent home groups, beginning in the week commencing 3rd December, and continuing in the weeks of 10th and 17th. We hope that the groups will help us to meet others in the congregation, and we'll be using Marcus Borg and John Dominic Crossan's book, The First Christmas, as the focus. It takes us on an exploration of the different ways in which the Christmas story has been told in the Gospels – you may find some surprises! Christmas is a great time to invite friends, family and neighbours to church. Why not take the chance to invite someone to our new candlelit Advent Carol Service led by our Advent community choir on 2nd December at 6.30pm, or to one of our other Christmas services or social events later in the month?

The message of Christmas is that the Prince of Peace comes to a world that is anything but peaceful and prods us to reconsider our priorities. May your Christmas be full of fun, but may there also be time for a quiet moment, perhaps around a candle in these darkest days of the year, to remember that the light of Christ still shines in the darkness.



Thanks to everyone who attended the YACHT Ceilidh on 29th September and the Church Lunch with Ian Murray MP on 28th October. About 130 children and adults enjoyed a super family occasion at our fifth Ceilidh evening of dance, piping and song. Hazel Macaulay again led the Ceilidh Band with great aplomb and we are lucky to have such a fine band playing

for us and to have Malcolm Reid "calling" us through the dances. Stirring piping from Katy Pink and Jamie Jackson entranced the youngsters. The multi-talented Tom Inglis again entertained with his tunes and songs. Everyone managed to squeeze into the lower hall for the traditional buffet of stovies or macaroni and oatcakes prepared for us by Serenity Café run by the charity Comas (Gaelic word for ability) who help those with enduring health, mental health and social problems. We were treated with Margaret Pitkeathly's simply marvellous shortbread all 180 pieces delivered safely and all scoffed! Grateful thanks to David Ferguson for the lighting, and the Social Committee and all the willing helpers who turned out to set the tables, serve and clear up!

All good fun and the net proceeds added another £780 to the YACHT fund.

The Church lunch was preceded by a talk from Ian Murray on the topic "How can religion and politics relate to each other today?" (see front cover photograph). Perhaps not the easiest of briefs to give our MP – he indicated that the librarian at the House of Commons had been a little nonplussed when asked if he had any articles which might be useful, his only contribution being "good luck on Sunday". He responded admirably,

fielding good questions from our youngsters such as: how his and other politicians' religious convictions were reflected in their political views; how open were politicians in their religious convictions in Parliament; and to what extent politicians spoke about motivating youth participation.

So there was plenty to talk about for the 100 or so who

enjoyed the buffet lunch that followed with its array of quiches, different salads and cakes provided by 181 Delicatessen and again masterminded by our very own Donald "MasterChef" MacLeod and his team of helpers. Thanks to all for your donations which after settling the costs ensured another £160 to campaign funds. YACHT started in 2014 and is now enter-

ing its final year. It reflected the Kirk Session's desire to continue to develop Greenbank's commitment to ministry to children and young people. We know it has been a great encouragement to Martin Ritchie that the congregation is so committed to young people. He and we are enormously grateful to all who have contributed so generously.

In the past four years the campaign has raised almost £300,000. We have pledges in place that, with fundraising, should take the gross total to £350,000. This is a wonderful result. Can we make one last push to reach the original target of £500,000 and so guarantee the continuation of our youth ministry for many years to come?

Our final year started with the receipt of £680 from the retiral collection at Professor John Knox's funeral, which was a wonderful gesture and contribution to the fund.

Eco Column – Festive Reminders

After an absence from the pages of *Connections*, Eco Column is back to suggest an approach to the festive season in line with our eco congregation credentials. In a world where there is so much conspicuous consumption at this time of year, we should be mindful of the excessive use of scarce natural resources.

So, first of all, have a think about how much we

consume at Christmas and try and reduce it a bit, even in small ways. Cutting down on some of the elements we take for granted will help. For example sending fewer cards and substituting electronic greetings cards reduces paper waste, while limiting our exotic food purchases will save fossil fuels by reducing food miles.

Re-use is a theme here as well. Make an effort to use last year's decorations, and the most sustainable Christmas tree is the one brought in in its pot from last year! That said, the advice is that if you have a plastic tree,

re-use it, but don't buy a new one. New trees should come from sustainable sources (like our Scout-supplied trees), but make sure you compost these after the festive season. Older Christmas lights, however, should be replaced with new LED light sets, since these significantly reduce energy consumption.

If you can't re-use decorations from last time, a good sustainable approach is to make them from natural materials. There is plenty of guidance and ideas around on this. Pine cones and dried fruit slices make good decoration strings. Paper, glue, and card go a long way in making a sustainable Christmas. Grandas and grandchildren can produce high quality material from almost nothing,

as our picture attests!

As to gifts, rather than expensive 'things', ethical gifts to help the developing world are easily found – helping local farming and other sustainable growth in poor economies for example. Our own fair trade stall carries more tangible ethical gifts, and a much wider range is available from fair trade outlets on and off line. When it comes to wrapping, recycling old paper, or using other paper with home decorated additions can be attractive.

A final word on food. Recent commentaries encourage us to think of reducing meat

consumption for health and to preserve the environment. A bit more creativity could take you into the now more extensive world of vegetarian options, but if this is a bridge too far, think more about sourcing your Christmas dinner from organic (and more local) suppliers.
