and click onto the link that will take you to the webcast, which you can watch live or on demand for four weeks after the broadcast. Much work has been undertaken by the "Stream Team", but especially by David Ferguson, Ewan Walker, and Josh Harling-Lee. A huge thank you to them, to those who supported the project financially, and all of the volunteers operating sound, cameras, and screen on a Sunday morning. (See also article on p 10.)

In the article below this letter you can read about the **Strategic Plan** for our common

life over the next five years. Our gratitude goes to the strategy team who put it together, and to everyone from the congregation who gave feedback towards the final version. No plan can ever encompass every aspect of our path, and we are mindful of the joke: "How do you make God laugh? Make plans!" Despite that, a shared plan is a great beginning on our journey forward, and we hope that you will all feel that there is a special place in it for you.

Our Session Clerk has borne much of the burden of scribing the many revisions of paperwork, and I am very grateful to Valerie for all that she has been doing. A parallel process that is still ongoing is the review of our governance and committee/ action group framework. The Session will continue to refine this over the coming months, with a view to launching a new structure later in 2020.

At the end of the day, all of this is important for only one reason. It is our best attempt to create an environment where together we can live out and proclaim our faith as disciples of Jesus in this place. At the heart of that faith is the love of God which came among us in Christ, a universal love that urges us on to greater care and compassion for this fragile earth and its people. "God our Makar" is a phrase you will hear frequently from my lips. By using this address, I emphasise the dimension of God which is like a poet who "draws beauty out of chaos, brings a harvest out of sorrow, and leads the exiles home." God uses us too in this creative enterprise which we are part of by simply being born.

Greenbank's Plans for the Next Five Years

The Strategic Plan for Greenbank in the next five years is now complete. You will find a copy included with this edition of Connections, and when you are next in touch with your District elder they will be glad to discuss it with you.

The Plan has benefited from input from the congregation, including at the consultation meetings held in September 2019. The Minister and Kirk Session are very grateful for that. The Plan is now at the delivery stage and here is where you can get involved. There is to be a new system of church committees, groups and teams to replace the ones that have been in place for over 20 years. They have served us well but are now showing their age. The Session and Board will need more people to help make sure that all the good ideas in the Plan get taken forward

and also that successful existing arrangements keep running.

Your elder will speak to you more about this but the message is clear – anyone with an interest in the future of Greenbank can play a part; youth or age are no barrier. For example, if you can't get out and about as much as before, you might be able to help by sharing with friends articles and insights from *Greenbank Connections* or Sunday worship via our streaming service.

Please read the Strategic Plan and think how you can be involved in its delivery. Speak to your elder about it or, if you wish, contact me directly. This is an exciting time in the life of Greenbank as we embark on our next five year journey.

Deepening Commitment at Greenbank – Membership

What does it mean to be a member? How can you become a member of the congregation?

Membership on the most important level is through Baptism, when the church affirms God's "yes" to us by the sacrament which uses the symbolism of going under the water and re-emerging to remind us of the crucifixion and resurrection, and the drama of a new start with God which washes away anything that is weighing us down. Infant baptism reminds us of the simplicity of God's relationship with us an unconditional acceptance as we offer the child into the mystery of relationship with God, and life in the community of God's Church. Adult baptism contains the same offer, but with the chance to profess faith, which is done on behalf of infants by the parents, supported by the congregation. If you have never been baptised, then why

If you have never been baptised, then why not consider a path to offering yourself into that new relationship with God? If you have been baptised as an infant, why not consider offering yourself in Confirmation/Profession of Faith? If you have been a member of another church, why not transfer your membership to Greenbank if you are settled here? If you have been a member of another denomination, why not consider being welcomed into membership here, through the offer of a hand of fellowship? If you feel that you'd like to associate with Greenbank formally, but are not able to commit to profession of faith, then there is the option to become an "adherent", which connects you to our congregational networks.

Membership is symbolic, but also practical. It helps us to keep close to you as we grow in relationship. You will have an elder who offers contact with the church and pastoral care. Above all, you will have affirmed your commitment to Greenbank as a part of the Church of God, and we'd love to have you draw closer.

Genesis for Normal People!

Our Lent Study for 2020

Hot off the presses is the second edition of this engaging, witty and accessible entry point to the book of Genesis, which we'll be using as the basis for our Lent Study in 2020. Some of you will remember the excellent podcast that I've mentioned: *The Bible for Normal People*. It's a tongue-in-cheek title which acknowledges that the jargon and specialisation of Biblicalgeekerycan sometimes


get in the way. Despite this aim, the podcast and this book are underpinned by impressive scholarship from Pete Enns and Jared Byas – but they wear the scholarship lightly.

In the words of the authors: "This book is not for scholars or seminary students, but we will gladly sell them a copy if they want one. We wrote this for people like you – people who are curious about the Bible and want to get a handle on what Genesis is about; people who don't want to spend the next five years of their lives learning Hebrew or slogging through thousands of pages of

details. We know how it is. You want to get to the point. And we want to help."

In the book you'll find clarity on the issues of ancient culture, cosmology, and politics. Excellent and engaging diagrams, maps, and tables draw a wealth of scholarship into digestible formats. There's a gentle tone, which makes it easy to read, but which reveals very important perspectives on "the sa-

cred book" and the famous stories that it contains. Not "just myth" but sacred writing from the people of Israel that asked the "why" questions in attempting to understand their story in light of their faith in Yahweh, the God of Israel.

This Lent, we invite you to read the book, join a home group led by one of the ministry team, and enjoy the *Bible for Normal People* experience. You can mix and match home groups according to your weekly schedule, but subject to availability we are planning to offer Monday-Thursday evenings and Thursday afternoon sessions. It's a great way to get to know more people in the congregation in a relaxed atmosphere as well as to get stuck into the book.



News from Scottish Love in Action

Scottish Love in Action has been speaking up for destitute and marginalised children in India with all its challenges for the last 20 years. At the start of 2020 we are delighted to have some bright news to share.

On *Sunday 23rd February* there will be a brief focus on Scottish Love in Action at our morning service. So

many of you have made it possible for SLA to bring love, education and independence to our Indian children, and we say a very sincere thank you to all who have so lovingly supported and encouraged us over the many years since QII adventured to India.

On *Sunday 8th March*, International Womens' Day, we are delighted that the BBC have chosen Scottish Love in Action to be the *BBC Radio 4 Charity Appeal Partner*. There will be more information in the March *Connections*.

As you know, our great sadness this past year has been having to withdraw our funding from the *Light of Love School and Home in Tuni*. This has been an incredibly difficult but correct decision – we had no option. But Tuni will always have a special place in our hearts.

However, we have moved on to help the *ASRITHA Rainbow Home*, home to about 100 girls rescued from living on the street. Hyderabad is one of the fastest growing cities in the world, with an estimated 28,000 street children. *Rainbow Homes* rescues boys and girls and gives them a home and education.

VOICE 4 Girls works with marginalised girls who are at risk of being removed from education. This inspirational programme empowers girls to resist early marriage (often at 12 or 13 years old), and to cope with the violence against females endemic in Indian society. Recently VOICE 4 Girls has also been working with boys, recog-

nising that it is essential to change their mindsets too.

We are thrilled that The Royal (Dick) School of Veterinary Studies, University of Edinburgh, is partnering with us in our social welfare enterprise dairy farm in India. During January, Sheila Cannell, SLA Trustee, and Michelle Davitt, SLA CEO, visited the Hyderabad home for our Annual Inspection.

Towards Making Greenbank Dementia Friendly

Last autumn a brief meeting was held after the morning service to develop further our aim of removing barriers to participation in Greenbank. This meeting focused on the needs of people living with Dementia. Following that, a



small group met and made plans to take us forward. The four areas we focused on were:

- 1. The establishment of a monthly dementia friendly service of worship. These will be held on Thursday afternoons and will last 35–40 minutes, using familiar hymns and readings and a simple address. The service will take place in the familiarity of the sanctuary and be preceded by tea and coffee in the Main Hall. The first of these will be on Thursday 27th February at 3 pm. Members and friends are encouraged to come along to share refreshments and worship with those who are experiencing the effects of dementia. These gestures of friendship will be an important part of our provision.
- Two "Dementia Friends" talks will be held on Thursday 5th March in the Braid Room at 1.30pm and again at 3.30pm to which all are invited; see below.
- Two of our members with experience in the field of dementia have conducted a walk around the buildings and will liaise with the Property Convener to discuss maximum safe access.
- 4. We will promote a long term goal of seeking a *Dementia Friendly Award*, an important part of which will be letting people know that we value being dementia friendly and accommodating the needs of all our people.


Online Broadcasts of Worship - Starting Soon!

Greenbankers will be aware that our main worship on Sundays (normally at 10.30am) will soon be filmed and broadcast weekly on the internet. As part of our new Strategy for Outreach, we aim to harness new media routes to connect with our members and the wider community. The Kirk Session determined this route with a view to supporting existing members who are away, or housebound, and who can "catch up" with worship at times which suit them; each service will be available for four weeks.

Local care homes have indicated an interest in showing our Sunday services live on their large screens, as they are unable to obtain transport to bring residents to church on Sunday mornings. We also aim to attract people to online worship from our local community and beyond, who are either unable to attend, or who would like to try us out at a distance, possibly before coming to worship in person at the church. Much of the new equipment has been in use over recent months, including the projection and sound systems. A lot of preparatory work has gone into planning for aspects such as camera angles, sound and lighting. The various issues of safeguarding and risk have been carefully assessed in line with Church of Scotland guidance and in consultation with the congregation. A sample service was filmed on 8th December, and shown on 19th January to those members who wished to see it.

In order to highlight for visitors or newcomers that worship is being broadcast, each service will be introduced with a welcome to those watching online. The printed Order of Service will contain a reference at the top of the inside front page, and there will be a notice in the vestibule.

Although we will not be focusing cameras on the congregation on a regular basis, if you do not wish to be on film occasionally you can choose to sit in areas of the church which will not be covered by the cameras. These are the rear nave pews below the balcony, parts of the north and south transepts, and the gallery. If you need guidance on where these areas are, ask a member of the welcome team on a Sunday morning.

If you have any questions about this exciting new initiative in our faith journey, please contact any member of the streaming project team, your elder or the Session Clerk.

The current pattern of worship will be unchanged, and after a short time we anticipate that it will become part of our normal outreach. We ask for God's blessing on this new dimension to spreading the Gospel, and that readers pray for it to bear fruit!

World Mission News

Christmas, and happy times celebrating with friends and families over the holiday, may seem like a distant memory now: all the planning and preparation in the past, the lights and decorations firmly packed away for another year.

We received news from our Mission Partner in the days leading up to Christmas, which brought home the many gifts and delights of the season that we can all take for granted. In the letter (available on the Church of Scotland website), the Rev John McCulloch described the daily trials of crossing the Gaza Border at the Hamas Checkpoint. John spoke of a young baby and her grandmother, whom he had met on a recent crossing and who were travelling on to Jerusalem for specialist cancer treatment for the little girl, Sajida. The article outlined that it was not uncommon for children to cross the border without their parents: Israel does not grant many parents the permission to accompany their children, so that they don't remain 'illegally' within Israel or the West Bank.

John and his wife offered to help Sajida and her grandmother through the checkpoint with their bags and to drive them straight on to the hospital in Jerusalem. They do not know if the little girl survived her treatment or was re-united with her parents. Nor do they know if they made it back from Jerusalem into Gaza.

Another article, published in *The Guardian* earlier in 2019, entitled 'A Jeru-

salem hospital where Palestinian babies die alone' and written by Oliver Holmes & Hazem Balousha, talks of the impossibly difficult situations some new mothers find themselves in, when their babies are receiving medical care in Jerusalem. See:
