Dear President Trump. A plea from Scotland

Congratulations on, in political the world's terms. becoming most powerful individual. You will certainly have learned during the last year how quickly things can change and how vulnerable we all are to the actions of others. We pray you will be interested in doing something for the children of the world during your second term. You have the power to make a huge difference to all young people. Thought for the Month

Around the time of the shortest day, I read of a monk, who at midnight would light a candle and say to the darkness "I beg to differ." It created a lasting image in my mind of someone who, having spent time in contemplation, facing light and shadow, both within and without, expressed his commitment, in a gracious disagreement with the forces of darkness. A choice of focus really, like the person in a concentration camp, who scratched on his wall "I believe in the sun, even when it is not shining."

Many things continue to speak of suffering in the world - wars and revenge killings, disasters due to climate change, memories of the Holocaust and much political unrest. A leading article in The Times this month, quoting the parents of children murdered at Southport, began with "We're looking for the light in the darkness." We share the longing for the filter that will let us see light in the darkness. Remember how on Holocaust Memorial Day the Guildhall in London was flooded with candles? A moving reminder to the world that the light could not be extinguished, even in the face of unspeakable horror. The candles spoke of a united "We beg to differ" from the community of faith.

I am reminded of Studdert Kennedy's poem *Faith*. Studdert Kennedy was an Anglican priest and army chaplain whose poetry captures not only the horrors of war but the humour and camaraderie and courage he witnessed among the soldiers. The poem *Faith* captures his choice of focus, commitment to the values of faith, despite the realities that would seek to wreck it.

"How do I know that God is good? I don't. I gamble like a man. I bet my life Upon one side in life's great war. I must, I can't stand out. I must take sides."

In the poem, he goes on to explain what he believes and why, naming the reality of both good and evil, of light and darkness. His words, born not of naive optimism, but of a steady commitment, echo those of the ancient monk –

"I bet the scent of life against its stink. That's what faith works out at finally.

Such as my faith, and such are my reasons for it, and I find them strong enough. And you? You want to argue? Well, I can't. I choose the Christ."

Studdert Kennedy, like so many of those who have sought to be faithful, echoes the affirmation "I beg to differ." It's maybe not a bad mantra for today's People of the Way?

The singers sparkled throughout, particularly in their blue and white saltire outfits for the second section, and their musical director David was full of energy and fun. We had an audience of around 170

people and there was great enthusiasm and appreciation of the show. Many volunteers were involved both in planning and on the night, I hope that I have thanked them all. During the interval we had tea and cakes in the hall and there was a lovely buzz of conversation. The catering team did an amazing job, serving everyone so quickly.

We raised just over £1,700 after expenses, and our congregation also gave a great welcome to all our visitors.

Changing the World a Bite at a Time

Thank you to the Greenbank World Church Group for inviting me to update you on the situation at *True Origin*, the not-for-profit Fair Trade social enterprise that Greenbank Church kindly supports.

Many of you know we had a food standards issue with one of our long-term suppliers, Eswatini Kitchen, late last year. We had to stop selling their products, putting us in a crisis. We are working together to resolve the issue and with support from many individuals True Origin will survive. We hope to be able to sell Eswatini Kitchen products again late in 2025.

Fair Trade really matters. Last year we sponsored a visit to the UK from Howard Msukwa, a smallholder rice farmer from Northern Malawi. Howard visited Greenbank with me around seven years ago. This time he spoke at the Cornerstone Centre and talked about Climate Change and the lack of resilience in poor, rural communities, and the support that Fair Trade has brought. He asked that we seek out and buy Fair Trade products when we can and think about the lives of those who produce our food.
