Thought for the Month Mystery, muddle, miracle

On Christmas Eve, as the darkness outside deepens outside the Chapel of King's College, Cambridge, inside the congregation at the Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols stands for the final reading from the Bible. This is introduced with the words "St John unfolds the great mystery of the Incarnation." It concludes "the Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us, (and we beheld his glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father,) full of grace and truth."

For some people this is not so much a mystery as a muddle. They find God-talk at best confusing, even dismissing it as incomprehensible and incompatible with a contemporary understanding of the world. However, while recognising that at the heart of our faith is this "great mystery" of God becoming a human being. Christians must be ready to use their God-given minds to explore and to understand it as best we can. Like a character in EM Forster's A Passage to India, we may say, "I like mysteries but I rather dislike muddles."

To claim with St John that "the Word became flesh" is to assert that Jesus is not only someone through whom God communicates,


as through one of the ancient prophets, but is nothing less than God's self-communication.

- Jesus not only speaks the Word of God: he is the Word of God.
- Jesus not only speaks the truth: he is the truth.
- Jesus not only does the work of God: he is God.

Think of the entire process as God becoming involved with the world in the person of Jesus. As Eugene Peterson renders John's words, "The Word was made flesh and blood and moved into the neighbourhood." God comes as a fresh, invigorating presence into all neighbourhoods. This is the content of the Christian Gospel. This is the miracle of Christmas. By being one of us Jesus reveals to us who God actually is, has been, and will be.

Unlike St Luke, John does not give us down-to-earth stories about pregnant women, a decreeing emperor, weary travellers, angel choirs, visiting shepherds. And yet here we are confronted directly with the One who becomes wholly involved in human existence in the unique, unpredicted, and unpredictable event we call the Incarnation.

When we have said all that we can say, the mystery remains. Here, some wise words of the late John McIntyre may help us:

"As each Christmas returns, the greatest single responsibility which Christians bear is to try to recapture something of the sheer unexpectedness, the stunning imaginativeness of that more excellent way which God finally chose, to make his love and forgiveness unmistakeably real to his people."

That is why at Christmas we can lose ourselves in wonder, love, and praise as once again we join in the familiar words:

Word of the Father, now in flesh appearing!
O come, let us adore Him,
Christ the Lord.

Greenbank Church Social Justice Action Group Palestine/Israel

Greenbank's Social Justice Action Group has recently discussed its priorities and has affirmed a continuing focus on the Palestine crisis. It recently supported the Edinburgh Direct Aid fundraising coffee morning, noting that organisation's current project work in Gaza. The Group will consider further fundraising and lobbying actions in due course. Meantime, for information, it is worth highlighting the position of the Church of Scotland on Palestine/Israel. The UNHCR Commission of Inguiry report on Gaza (September 2025) concluded Israel was actively committing genocide against Palestinians. There have been years of killing and injustice in Israel/ Palestine, and the period since the Hamas attack into Israel on 7th October, 2023 has been particularly brutal. As we all continue to pray for a just and peaceful solution, the following is a brief summary of Church of Scotland pronouncements over the years on Palestine/ Israel.

The following was included in The Special Report of the World Mission Council (WMC) to the General Assembly (GA) of the Church of Scotland in 2019:

 It highlighted the desperate situation of the Palestinian community.

- 2. It condemned the illegal expansion of Settlements in East Jerusalem and the West Bank
- 3. It called for an end to the demolition of Palestinian houses and the expropriation of Palestinian land.
- 4. It encouraged all Church agencies to engage with Israeli, Palestinian, and International organisations that are working to end the Israeli occupation through non-violent means.
- The core principle guiding the Church is the call for a peace based on justice and respect for the equal rights of all people.

And most recently the deliverance of the General Assembly in 2025 included:

Assembly Trustees

14. Encourage the whole Church of Scotland to continue to pray for peace with justice in Israel, Gaza, the West Bank, and Lebanon, and to continue to advocate for the creation of a State of Palestine alongside the State of Israel (Sections 15.1 to 15.10).

(NB the UK Government has since recognised the state of Palestine)

16. In relation to Israel/Palestine:

(i) Condemn the resumption of the war on Gaza, the blockade of

- food and humanitarian aid, the ongoing forcible displacement of Gazans, and the continued holding of hostages;
- (ii) Instruct the Assembly Trustees in collaboration with the Faith Action Leadership Team to advocate to the Government of the UK that it must exert all efforts towards the upholding of International Humanitarian Law, the establishment of a ceasefire, (NB there is now a fragile ceasefire in place since 10th October, 2025) the lifting
- of the blockade on food and humanitarian aid, and the release of the remaining hostages;
- (iii) Renew the call to the Government to stop granting export licences for the sale of weapons to Israel.

Christmas in Israel-Palestine

Around 45,000 of the West Bank's Palestinian population of 2.7 million are Christian and, before the current troubles, 1,000 or so Christians lived in Gaza. In addition to this there are over 180,000 Christians in Israel. The largest churches in Gaza, Jerusalem and the West Bank are Catholic and Greek Orthodox, but many other groups have a significant presence.

Bethlehem, the town where Jesus was born, is situated in the Palestinian territory of the West Bank. There the Church of the Nativity has for many years been a focal point for Christmas celebrations including a Christmas Eve parade through the town, carol singing in Manger Square, and a midnight mass led by the Latin Patriarch of Jerusalem and broadcast around the world. In 2023 and 2024, Christmas festivities in Bethlehem were overshadowed by the war and only modest celebrations took place.

Another sacred place for Christians and other religions, the Old City of Jerusalem, is a major pilgrimage site, particularly at Christmas. Traditionally there would be carol concerts, decorations and special events, culminating with midnight mass on 24th December at the Church of the Holy Sepulchre.

There are better prospects for this year. Flights for tourists have returned and the atmosphere is much more upbeat since the return of most hostages. The West Bank is still suffering though, and it is likely that any tourists that go will continue to avoid Bethlehem except for a brief visit. Palestinian Christians who would in the past have travelled the few miles from Ramallah or Bethlehem to take part in prayers and processions in Jerusalem now find that, due to Israel's control over movement, permits to travel are almost impossible to obtain.

At the Church of Scotland hotels in Jerusalem and Tiberias there are signs of a return of business. At the House Hotel in Jerusalem (formerly called the Guest House) there will again be a Christmas market in the week before Christmas. Last year over 3,000 people visited and it was a great success. It is too early to see a mass return of tourists, but a few small groups have visited with more booked for early in 2026.

Transitioning to Net Zero - a personal story

My wife Alison and I are not the first Greenbankers to go all electric but I am happy to share a little of our experiences to encourage others to do the same. This year we had major renovation works carried out on our house. As part of that project, we cut off the gas supply, enhanced the electricity supply, installed a heat pump, along with more insulation, plus solar panels and batteries. Our house is now entirely electric for heating, hot water and cooking, using an induction hob and electric oven. The transformation is exciting and, so far, works well.

The solar panels generate electricity even on colder days, so long as it is bright – full sun is not required. The power they produce is firstly consumed within the house and any surplus goes into the batteries. If the batteries become full, any surplus goes to the grid. My 15 year-old car had to be traded in recently and I was delighted last month when, for the first time, I charged up my elec-



tric car entirely from the batteries using free electricity.



The government is encouraging people to convert their heating from gas to electric by offering a grant of up to £7,500 towards the cost of a heat pump. Our pump cost a little over that. It sits outside in the back garden and occasionally whirrs away to itself to top up our heating or hot water. Living with a heat pump requires a different approach to gas central heating. Instead of programming the heating to give the temperature a boost, the pump remains on all the time, topping up the temperature as required. Our pump efficiency is between 300% and 500%, depending on the outside temperature, compared to less than 100% for a modern gas boiler.

It's too soon to make a meaningful comparison on running costs, but I understand they may be very similar to our previous combined gas



Annual Advent and Christmas Appeal for Christian Aid

Throughout Advent we will be having our customary annual appeal for Christian Aid. The 2025 Christmas appeal will focus on families caught up in conflict in the Democratic Republic of Congo with the message "No crib for a bed.....when you're fleeing violence."

Many people in DRC have been forced to leave their homes due to deadly conflict, including a young mother Chance who ran on foot with her newborn as bombs fell. She found medical assistance and relative safety in Katashola Camp for displaced people, but her children are still hungry and at grave risk of malnutrition and malaria.
