Thought for the month The Great Outdoors



"Believe me, for I know, you will find something far greater in the woods than in books. Stones and trees will teach you that which you cannot learn from the masters."

That was written almost 900 years ago by St Bernard of Clairvaux, who's pictured above. Born about 1090, Bernard was crucial to the founding of a new order of monks – the Cistercians. Melrose Abbey was one of their monasteries. The Cistercians lived close to nature, tending their own farms on land often brought into cultivation for the first time. Perhaps that prompted Bernard to emphasise the importance of the outdoors.

Eight hundred years later, John Muir (the Dunbar-born natural-



ist and founder of the US national parks movement, who's pictured below) came to a similar understanding. He too had lived close to nature throughout his life. A couple of years before his death in 1914 at the age of 76, he wrote:

"Everybody needs beauty as well as bread, places to play in and pray in, where Nature may heal and cheer and give strength to body and soul alike."

Greenbank has no areas of wilderness to match Yosemite in California which inspired John Muir. But as city dwellers we're relatively fortunate to have two excellent (and completely different) local parks and the Pentland Hills close at hand. There we can find, if we choose, places which can heal and cheer, trees and stones which can teach.

Our autumn Forest Church on Saturday 4th October will tap into the spiritual power of the great outdoors. It's an event for every age and all abilities. The details are opposite. Come along and discover what so inspired Bernard of Clairvaux and John Muir of Yosemite – and countless others through the ages.



Who would have thought?

Who would have thought that when 23 young people from Greenbank, led by Gillie Davidson and Brian Barron, went to India in 1999, in 2025 we would be celebrating 25 years of the charity, Scottish Love in Action.

In 25 years, SLA has helped well over 25,000 children and young people living in poverty in India into better lives.

So many members of Greenbank have been involved over the years – going to India, running and attending fundraising activities, as members of QII, giving talks, donating to SLA and serving on the SLA Board – a big shout out to you all. Thank you.

SLA's initial work was with the Light of Love Home in Tuni. More recently SLA has moved on to supporting inspirational Indian organisations who work to transform the lives of children and young people. The ASRITHA Rainbow Home supports former street children. Livelihoods supports children from Rainbow Homes as they transition into adulthood. VOICE-4 (formerly known as VOICE 4 Girls) empowers marginalised adolescent girls and boys.

Despite the improvements we hear about in the Indian economy, many young people are still being left behind; for 25 years, SLA has helped these children and young people into a better future.

Thanks to you all; and we hope that you will attend some of our SLA25 celebratory events in November.

Small Changes, Big Savings: Energy Tips for Winter

One practical way to care for the planet – and our wallets – is by making small energy-saving changes in our homes. The Energy Saving Trust have helpful tips that could save a typical household hundreds of pounds a year.

Simple actions can add up quickly. For example, switching off appliances on standby could save around £40 a year and turning off unnecessary lights can add another £7. Washing clothes at 30°C and reducing machine use by only operating with a full load saves £22, while avoiding the tumble dryer altogether could cut bills by £45.

Water use is another key area as metering would make us more aware. Taking a four-minute shower instead of a long one can save £50 annually. Even swapping one bath per week for a shower adds up to £8. Filling the kettle with only the water vou need could save £26 and topping up your hot water tank insulation could save another £35.

Draught-proofing your windows, floors and

doors at home offers the largest individual saving at £70 per year. Reducing dishwasher use with full loads also helps, with a £11 saving.

That all adds up to £314 savings a year. These actions not only lower bills, they reduce our carbon footprint by using fewer resources. As energy prices rise and environmental concerns grow, every step we take, no matter how small, makes a difference.

Let us be mindful in our homes in how we live each day. Stewardship starts at home.
