So many changes, so many complications, and looking in two directions at once as the visa delay means that my head and heart are holding two rather wonderful congregations at the same time, with all the unique challenges and opportunities that each faces.

In your lives I know that many have been experiencing complexity in relationships, ill health, change, challenge of all kinds. It's part of the churn of life, but it's still demanding to deal with. Advice to step aside and to connect with God in the midst of the "whirlwind" might seem insensitive when there are so many things to deal with all at once. However, I'd like to mention the words "be still and know that I am God" and some of Psalm 46: "God is our helper. God our strength, in troubled times our aid; therefore should earth itself be moved, we shall not be afraid."

Take a moment in the midst of any turmoil to bring yourself before God and simply breathe in the connection which is beyond what we know and understand, and trust that God is there for all of us. that God "has our backs" and loves and holds us like beloved children.

In September's Connections, the Eco Group wrote a very good article on the upcoming COP26 conference in Glasgow in November (page 8, September issue).

Last week Carol Finlay, a staff member of the Faith Impact Forum of the Church of Scotland and member of the 'Glasgow Churches Together COP₂₆ Group', wrote a reflective article on faith, climate, caring for creation and loving our neighbours. As an example, she compares the heavy downfall and flooding in Glasgow (the latter partly due to blocked drains), and the continuous rain and flooding in a rural area of Nepal. She says "Scotland is used to rain but not to floods, Nepal waits each year for the monsoon and welcomes it with dread".

Of course, these are not the only areas affected by climate change and global partners of the Church of Scotland have been sharing their stories for many years of unprec-

edented increase of floods, bush fires and droughts, and erratic weather conditions.

She continues "in Scotland we do not just need to unblock our drains, but we need to unblock our ears, eyes and heart to this global crisis which we are in the midst of". You can read more at: From Nepal to Glasgow our faith calls us to care for Creation – Church of Scotland

Bethanv Care Shelter has now been renamed 'The Welcome Centre' based at the Havmarket Hub Hotel and provides accommodation for approximately 60 homeless people. It is open from 4th October 2021 until the 1st May 2022.

We at Greenbank have agreed to participate in a rota cooking and serving hot evening meals on 4-5 nights during this period. We would

really appreciate any donations towards the costs of the food and are also keen to recruit some new team members. Could you make a financial donation or would you like to get involved in the cooking?

Families Together

The Families Together coalition started in 2017 when a small group of organisations led by Amnesty International, British Red Cross, Oxfam. Refugee Council and UN-HCR joined forces.

For many thousands of refugees in the UK, safety from conflict has come at a heavy price. The UK Government's rules have forced parents apart from their children, sisters from brothers, with elderly parents left behind. Some may have reached safety but, instead of feeling relief, the guilt of separation from loved ones bears down on them. Inevitably, people are left feeling isolated, traumatised and alone as they grapple with a new language and try to find their feet in a foreign country with minimal support. Through in-depth research, real life experiences have been uncovered of refugee children living alone in the UK.

The coalition is continually growing, reaching across the country and providing frontline services for refugees. The organisation supports an expansion of refugee family reunion based on their firsthand experiences of the current rules. To find out more about the campaign look at

Because I am shortly going to spend a few days on Lindisfarne, my thoughts are inevitably tilting towards islands at the moment. I enjoy islands, but perhaps most especially both Iona and Lindisfarne, which have history written into every cobblestone, and which Richard Holloway refers to as 'thin' places - places where the boundarv between earth and beyond is very porous. Whether reached by CalMac ferry or tidal causeway. there is a sense of both moving away from the routines and responsibilities of daily life, and towards an as vet undefined 'newness' on arrival. I've been reflecting about what it is that impels people of our time to move towards places of stillness, removed from the comforts of our Western lifestyles?

The Desert Fathers did it in their time, Julian of Norwich did it in her little cell, contemplative communities continue to do it, and increasingly many today seek a place where they can explore what they understand to be their deepest values. Paul Tillich called that 'the Ground of our Being,' and John Robinson 'ultimate reality.' We're challenged to see beyond the material reality to grasp, however briefly, the sacred in everything.

There's surely something in these 'sacred places' that draws us to-

wards silence and a heightened awareness of the reality around us, from which we easily become distracted. Meister Eckhart, the famous mystic, said 'Nothing in all creation is so like God as stillness.' Might it then be possible to 'be still and know...?'

It's one of the lessons of the pandemic that, at the time of greatest threat, most of us became more aware of our vulnerability, and our dependence on key workers and others to keep us safe. Our bins were emptied, our groceries delivered, our necessities were requested on-line and brought to our doorstep.... The web of life held fast. Our interconnectedness was strengthened. Now we move into new possibilities – together...

An Open Hand is a ministry that aims to provide parents in severe hardship with a present for their child's birthday, along with books and items for the family to play with together, such as simple games and stationery.

We hope to give more children the opportunity to celebrate their birthday by **reducing the financial burden it places on their family**. The present given to each child will be specific to that child's interests and tastes so that they receive a gift that they will really cherish and enjoy.

Referral agencies across Edinburgh can apply to An Open Hand on behalf of families who are eligible, indicating on the application form specific toys the child would wish for.

This will then be delivered, with the other birthday items, to the family's home, or the family can collect it from Greenbank Parish Church if they prefer. It would be wonderful to have your support in backing this project to help as many families who are in need as we can in our city.

One way you can contribute is through the 'donate' button on the Greenbank Parish Church website.

Alternatively, we have begun an initiative called 'My Birthday – Your Present', where a donation leaves your bank account once a year on your own birthday, meaning that whilst you are celebrating your own birthday, you are also enabling a child in Edinburgh to celebrate their birthday – a double celebration!
