Homing

Recently I visited Whithorn in Galloway. South West Scotland is a part of the world which I haven't visited much, despite living in Scotland my entire life so far. So, with the impending departure to the USA (still in the "slow lane" for the visa...) I wanted to go to some places that would be unlikely to feature on future returns to visit family and friends, largely focused on eastern and northern Scotland.

What a glorious part of the world! The cross country drive from Edinburgh via Biggar largely avoids busy high speed roads. Gorgeous pastoral countryside changes to the hill farming territory around Abington and through the Dalween Pass. Then you emerge out into the lowland farming country once again and on to the coastal plains. There was a delicious sense of discovery for me in that trip. Having no heritage in that area, there was no sense of "homing" for me, but a lovely feeling of adding to my experience of Scotland. But it's home for many, and I was struck by this poem which I found cast on a plaque in the peaceful grounds of Whithorn Priory – deserted save an old woman walking her dog at around 6pm on a May Monday.

Whithorn Manse

I knew it as Eden
that lost walled garden,
past the green edge,
of priory and village:
and, beyond it, the house,
withdrawn, white,
one window alight.

Returning, I wonder,
idly, uneasily,
what eyes from inside
look out now, not in,
as mine once did,
and what might grant me
a right of entry.

Is it never dead then
that need of an Eden?

Even this evening,
estranged by age,
I ogle that light
with a child's greed,
wistfully claiming
lost prerogatives
of homecoming.

Reid was the son of a Church of Scotland minister who lived for around 60 years outside Scotland, firstly in Spain and then in New York. Scottish writer, Muriel Spark, who also wrote for the *New Yorker* magazine, described him as “the second worst dressed man in New York”! Reid was an expatriate who didn't romanticise Scotland, but still found a deep sense of homecoming in his return. The notion of our need for an “Eden”, a place where we find the deepest connections of source and roots, is one that resonates with the

work of another admired Scottish poet, Edwin Muir.

Both Reid and Muir are clear-eyed about people and places, and had a sense of forward-looking adventure and discovery as well as that wistful notion of “Eden” in our lives.

What is this sense of home for us? I suspect that our life experiences will shape it. Some who have come to this country to escape the tyranny of oppression in the country of their birth may have found a new sense of home in Scotland. Others may hold strongly to the place of their birth whilst still finding a sense of home here. Some, like myself, may have moved around during their upbringing and working lives and so find home to be a fluid concept with aspects of “home” spread around the country rather than one location, and connected to the significant relationships formed there.

As we prepare to move to the USA, Greenbank plays a strong part in my sense of “homing” that will always be associated with my 49 years in Scotland. That can never be taken away, and indeed the sense of Scotland as “home” will probably be stronger than ever. However, for me, “Eden” is not in the past, but in the present. It is the creation of relationships and experiences where we are now, and so is dynamic, and not fixed in either our own early lives nor in a mythical past. Let us all be part of creating “new Eden” wherever we find ourselves. I know that for lucky people who come into the Greenbank “garden” there will be Eden times ahead. With my love and gratitude.

It's been really lovely to hear the patter as wee children begin playing with the toys again and to know that parents are able to relax in the Main Hall.

Faith Impact at the General Assembly

It is premature to be writing about the General Assembly of 2021 before it has taken place but this is the last chance for *Connections* to look at what it is saying about world church issues before the summer break. The Faith Impact report will be given on 26th May and I encourage you to look back at what was said then. The Church of Scotland website will be the place to find the report (in the section on the General Assembly) and also the debate on it.

This is the first full report of the Faith Impact Forum which is the successor to the World Mission and the Church and Society Councils. The Forum has a very wide remit and has organised its business into three main themes – congregational engagement, global justice and public witness. At Greenbank we have retained our World Mission Team in our Society and Creation Theme alongside Eco-congregation, Help the Homeless and Social Justice but there are many close links.

The Forum's report to the Assembly still has a strong world church focus, made all the more powerful by being integrated with the broader themes. The Deliverances – the matters that the Assembly will decide on and which will inform what is handed down to Presbyteries and congregations – include:

- ▷ That the UK Government should do all that it can to ensure COVID-19 vaccines are available throughout the world, particularly in resource-poor countries, on the basis of clinical need to preserve human life.
- ▷ That the Forum should call for the development of safe and legal routes for people desperately seeking sanctuary so that they can travel, live, work and con-

tribute to our society with respect and dignity; and

- ▷ That the UK Government and Parliament should continue to provide a minimum of 0.7% of Gross National Income as Overseas Development Assistance in line with the International Development (Official Development Assistance Target) Act 2015 and all main parties' 2019 manifesto commitments.

When the Faith Impact Forum's Convener, the Very Rev Dr Susan Brown of Dornoch Cathedral, introduces her report she will be able to draw attention to matters that are of current pressing concern. We will have to wait and see what she actually says but we can expect her to draw attention to the dire situations in Israel/Palestine and Myanmar. She is also likely to speak about the UK Government's new plans for immigration which, in the view of the Church of Scotland, are out of line with the Church's mission to those who have been displaced by war, famine and climate change.

I hope this has whetted your appetite for the Assembly coverage of world issues – watch this space!

Report from the Preses

We reported the business of the church in 2019 to you electronically. Little did we think that a whole year later we would be doing the same for the business of 2020 all due to "in person" meeting regulations imposed due to COVID-19 lockdown. The Board met in January 2020 but our meeting scheduled for 24th March was cancelled with lockdown imposed from the 23rd. The Board did not meet again in 2020 with church business being taken care of by a Moderator's Committee approved by the church trustees and comprising a number of office bearers from Session and Board. This committee met remotely, on screen, on several occasions during 2020.

Session and Board matters often required to be discussed alongside each other and I would like to thank our Moderator, Martin Ritchie, and our Session Clerk, Valerie Macniven, both of whom have worked tirelessly under difficult circumstances, for their contributions.

The church remained closed for worship from 23rd March with the exception of a short period in late autumn when reduced numbers, due to social distancing, were allowed to meet. However, our very success-

ful live-stream system allowed members to watch and participate in services every Sunday thanks to our technical team and musical contributors.

Despite the church being closed for worship and to our Hall users, management of meetings, property and finances was still required. We thank Alan Ramage, David Allan with his property team and John Ritchie with his finance team respectively for looking after these matters.

Our office and maintenance staff as well as Beadle, organist and caretakers spent the best part of the year on varying forms of furlough where the Government assisted with payment of salaries whilst they could not work. We have successfully retained all staff under this scheme and we require to thank Robert Young and Rosemary McCulloch for managing this situation.

COVID-19 along with the continually changing rules and regulations regarding how and when people could meet has caused a huge amount of work from a Health and Safety point of view. Gillian Sweetman has handled this with great efficiency, keeping us on the straight and narrow through a minefield of information.

We have kept in close contact with our Hall users, informing them of the often changing rules of meeting in person. We appreciate the financial assistance given by many of our Hall users in continuing to make donations despite not being able to use the premises for a large part of the year. The Lent and Easter appeal was able to proceed with the nominated beneficiary being The Coastguard Association, Lothian. This charity was chosen following their life-saving actions concerning relatives of members of our congregation. The sum of £3,400 was raised.

As we continue to build our property and finance teams we find that elected Board members are seconded onto these teams

where their expertise lies. In this connection members due to retire being Moira Land, Donald Milne and David Bogie have agreed to serve a further 3 year term. Ian McWilliam has also agreed to serve a further term.

Nominations for the election of new members to the Board have been received for Jan Corbett, Karen Young, Jane Harkin, Margot Gillon and Barbara Middleton. All have agreed to stand but if there are objections please contact me at moreduk@yahoo.co.uk.

We also thank those appointed Elders who have served the Board.

In closing, I would like to extend my grateful thanks to my predecessor as Congregational Treasurer, John Ritchie, for his careful stewardship of the finances over the past six years and for completing the 2020 accounts. Throughout the year, he was ably supported by Michael Struthers and Kathryn Sangster as Assistant Treasurers. In addition, Robert Young did sterling work on the Job Retention Scheme and Alan Ramage, David Bogie and Stephen Hadden offered support on treasury and accounting matters. In 2021, it is a clear tribute to all of the work carried out by John that Charlotte Tucker (accounts), Ian Thomson (banking) and I have been recruited to replace him!

Report from the Property Convener

2020 was a strange year for all of us. In Greenbank most of our attention was on coping with the changing regulations for access to our buildings as the levels of lockdown varied throughout the year. Our property budget was again around £31,000, to be used to keep our buildings up to date and in a good state of repair. Although there is also a reserve (Fabric Fund) which we can use for major and unexpected expenditure, we decided to try to reduce expenditure because of the uncertainty about the impact of the moratorium on worship on our finances, so we did not undertake any major new projects. However, essential maintenance and repair work continued.

We undertook work on:

- ▷ the church roof, which is an annual and growing commitment, given the age of our roofs. This year the cost was £6,000.
- ▷ the mutual wall with our neighbours which had become dangerous at the tennis court and was bowing heavily in the middle. The lower portion was completed in the Autumn but the work on the middle portion was delayed until the Spring of this year. The overall cost of the work was £5,500.
- ▷ the manse heating system which stopped producing heat and hot water towards the end of 2019. The system is complex and took time to resolve (£1500).
- ▷ repairing our two old boilers which heat the church, Main Hall and Lower Hall at a cost of around £1500. New problems leading to a failure of heating in both the church and the halls towards the end of the year led us to undertake a planned replacement of both boilers in 2021, in time for re-opening.

▷ our streaming equipment, buying a new computer and peripherals at a cost of nearly £1,000 to improve the quality of our streaming.

A major achievement has been the completion of the first draft of an extensive property manual for the church and hall buildings. For the first time we have in one place an explanation of how everything works. Huge credit for the manual lies with Ewan Walker, whose patient and meticulous approach has resulted in an exceptional piece of work.

This was my final year as Property Convener and, after six and a half years, I have moved on. Roddy Morrison has taken on the responsibility for co-ordinating the property team of Gillian Sweetman and Angus McLachlan (health, safety, security and fire safety), David Ferguson assisted by Ewan Walker (streaming and electrical work), Donald Milne (technical advice and practical work) and Moira Land who manages our halls. It has been a real pleasure for me to work with the entire team and the others on the property committee. I'd also like to thank John Ritchie who was treasurer for most of my period and put up with my endless requests for information and money with his customary good humour. In particular, I have to thank Ginny for her tireless work on many aspects of property and Mirek for his dedication, and willingness to tackle any task with commitment and enthusiasm.

Finally, I'd like to thank the congregation for keeping me informed of what needed to be done and in being patient till we could find the time and resources for work to be done.

Gift Aid: a BIG Thank You and a Gentle Reminder

During 2020 Greenbank Church recovered more than £44,000 of Gift Aid as a result of donations from our members and supporters. Thanks to everyone who contributed to this magnificent achievement! This income represents a significant uplift to the Church's finances and helps us as a congregation better to fulfil our Mission, particularly during current troubled times. Gift Aid is good stewardship, and going forward it is important that we maximise the value of our donations.

Who is eligible to give through Gift Aid? Anyone who pays Income Tax or Capital Gains Tax (subject to limits per 2. below). With the present basic rate of income tax of 20%, the Church can recover tax on donations at the rate of 25% – at no additional cost to the donor!

So: £4 becomes £5; £20 becomes £25; £100 becomes £125 and so on....

Other Key Features of Gift Aid

- ▶ No minimum contribution is required
- ▶ No specific amount has to be promised
- ▶ There is no fixed term during which contributions must be made
- ▶ Tax can be recovered retrospectively (up to 4 years later): this is done by the Church.

Donations given by a means which identifies the donor are potentially of greater value to the Church than “open plate” donations. This can be by various methods, including primarily: standing order (the most popular); cash in offering envelopes; cheques; payroll giving. Other digital means are increasingly becoming available

and during 2020 we introduced an online donation facility which is accessible via the Church website. We have plans for further ways of giving designed to obviate use of cash and make it easier to donate in future. To help us in this endeavour (see 1 below), and to ensure compliance with the Gift Aid rules (2 below) there are several matters you are asked please to consider:

1. If you currently do not give through Gift Aid, check if you are eligible as a taxpayer, and if so, please consider signing a Gift Aid Declaration.
2. If you do currently Gift Aid your donations, it's important to check that you are still paying as much or more tax (income and/or Capital Gains) than the amount of Gift Aid claimed on your donations (to ALL charities) in the corresponding tax year (which ends 5th April). If the answer is “no”, please inform the Gift Aid Administrator:

Guild

As restrictions ease we are looking forward to meeting one another, and being able to chat over tea or coffee in each other's houses and gardens. There will be a lot of news to catch up with! The Committee are beginning to work on plans for the summer and the next session. We may be able to arrange a limited form of coffee morning by July within the new guidelines. We are also beginning to plan meetings for our next session, with a range of speakers on inspiring projects, general interest and entertainment.

In the last three years across Scotland the Guild has raised (at the last count) £551,000 in support of all the wonderful work our project partners have carried out, touching the lives of people across the world and bringing hope and inspiration to so many. The effort and generosity of Guild members, especially during the past year when we have not been able to meet and share in person for worship, prayer, action and fellowship, is truly amazing. At the moment we are considering six new Guild Projects to be supported over the next three years. They are all interesting and cover a wide range of enterprises. In Greenbank we usually choose to support three of the six, taking one each year. Here are the projects.

Beat Scotland: This project will develop a network to raise awareness of eating disorders and encourage people to seek help.

Home for Good: Finding homes for vulnerable children in Scotland. This is a Christian charity passionate about



finding a home for every child who needs one. They hope to inspire people to think of fostering and adoption and to provide support for these families.

Pioneers: Chocolate heaven, South East Asia. This project intends to help build and develop a factory to support the production of sustainable chocolate products.

Starchild: Finding the light in every child, Uganda. This charity hopes to build a centre where children with a range of learning disabilities, particularly autism, can come to learn alongside their peers.

Hear our voice! Brazil: This is a project at Faculdade Unida de Vitória (UNIDA) designed to empower young women through theological education. UNIDA believes in an education that can transform lives in a violently unjust Brazilian society.

Kazunu: Village of Hope, Tanzania. Working with the Vine Trust and their partners on the ground, we will help them to take forward the development of a sustainable village with a school, health centre, and 40 individual homes as well as a community hub.

The lockdown restrictions have been difficult for us all. The lack of contact with friends and families and the loss of interesting and valuable activities was often boring and depressing. Our hope now, is that we will see slow progress back to a more normal level of sociable and useful living.

Carbon Footprint: Getting Our Own House in Order

In recent months a great deal of column space in *Connections* has been filled by our Eco-group providing valuable information, guidance and advice to the congregation on matters such as recycling, efficiency of home energy, our shopping habits, methods of travel and food purchasing, to name but a few. The congregation at Greenbank has already been granted a bronze level award from the Eco-Congregation Scotland Scheme and our Eco-Group believe that we are well on our way to achieving a silver level award. So, what are **WE** doing within our buildings at Braidburn Terrace to help preserve God's creation, The Planet Earth?

By far the largest part of our carbon footprint comes from heating our premises largely using a fossil fuel, natural gas. Church buildings, by their very nature, are difficult to deal with in terms of economical heating and retention of that heat. Our buildings date from 1900, 1927 and 2000; the older parts being of traditional solid stone and concrete construction, not easy to insulate.

We have a number of large spaces to heat including the Sanctuary, Main Hall and Centenary Hall. With high ceilings these areas add up to a considerable volume of space. Windows are largely single glazed including stained glass and roof spaces in most areas are not accessible to insulate.

One highly beneficial step forward in this battle has been the installation of an "intelligent heating system" which monitors the heat levels in several different zones against previously set desirable levels. This

system calculates when the heating should come on, taking account of weather conditions, in order to reach a comfortable temperature for use. Installation of this system has seen an average fall in our gas use and cost of around 33%.

We are currently looking at replacing our two main boilers which supply the Sanctuary, Main Hall and Lower Hall; both of which are around 30 years in age. The ideal, environmentally friendly solution would be to fit a ground or air source pump system but these are excessively expensive and are unlikely to be able to heat such large spaces. Looking to the future, hydrogen has been identified as the "green" fuel but the technology is in its infancy. Whilst yet to be finalised, our best solution may be to fit "hydrogen ready" boilers which would run on natural gas in the short term but have the capacity to convert. New boilers on their own would be more efficient, less expensive to run and cleaner than those presently located in our boiler room.

In terms of insulation, small steps have been taken, in order to keep costs down, to insulate spaces immediately accessible. Volunteer teams have insulated the floor beneath the office, always a cold spot, and fitted draught proofing to the windows. The large roof void over the main hall has also been insulated.

Other small, in-house projects include the replacement of hundreds of light bulbs with low energy LED units, fitting of a hand-dryer in the Gents toilet to save on paper towels, timers fitted on water immersions and electric heaters to prevent



overuse and fitting of door closers to minimise draughts and heat loss.

We have employed contractors to replace the failed roof-lights over the Braid and Hermitage Room corridor in double glazed units and to by-pass a water pump, reverting to using mains water pressure.

Recycling also forms part of our agenda and more user-friendly recycling bins have recently been purchased and installed.

We are currently putting together a more official Ethical Procurement Policy but have always checked that contractors used by us pay the minimum wage and do not use any form of forced labour.

Not only are we dealing with these practical issues in our buildings but we are also getting a strong message from the pulpit. Martin himself often raises the point of protecting our fragile planet and we have had a number of guest preachers with specific interests in the environment and climate change. A hard-hitting message was delivered by Sally Foster Fulton from Christian Aid regarding the problem across the globe. To paraphrase her sermon she said forget such niceties as “global warming” or “climate change”: what we are facing is chaos and climate disruption, rocketing to a point where the thermometer cannot be re-set because the planet is actually cooking itself.

Do we need a clearer message?

An Open Hand

This month sees the launch of a new project called *An Open Hand*! It is a partnership between *Greenbank Parish Church* and *Edinburgh City Mission*.

We are aiming to provide parents, who are in severe hardship and wouldn't otherwise be able to afford it, with a present to give to their child on their birthday. Let me tell you why we are setting this up

Currently, in Edinburgh, there are an estimated 77,600 people living in poverty, including one in five children. Levels of child poverty have risen by more than 25% in the past five years. Being in poverty can mean not being able to provide essentials for your family. Buying presents brings an added stress and financial strain for families or it is simply not possible and children go without a present.

Why do we consider birthdays so important?

When a child sees their family celebrating their birthday they feel special and significant within their family. It is a time when families can show how much they love and care for one another, and when families celebrate together it creates positive memories for everyone and helps strengthen family bonds.

If a family is unable to afford a gift, it can affect how the parent and child feel about the birthday. Some families in hardship avoid mentioning the birthday altogether to avoid the negative feelings associated with not being able to provide a gift. The lack of gift, therefore, denies the family the whole day of celebration and the chance to build those special and happy memories together.

An Open Hand is here to provide parents with presents for their children, so that the door can be opened to celebrating with their children. We feel this project is going to make a significant and positive difference to many families in Edinburgh, who face the strain of hardship every day. We hope it brings a time of joy and happiness that otherwise might not be possible.

We are asking for your help in a number of ways!

Firstly, we ask you to reflect quietly on how it might feel for the many children and families in these situations – to imagine your children, nieces, nephews and grandchildren waking up on their birthday to no celebration, no present, no feeling of being special, no joy, and consider how that might affect them as children and make them feel.

Secondly, please pray for this project.

Thirdly, would you consider donating to the project? We are setting up an initiative called ***My birthday – your present***. We are asking you to consider, on your birthday, making an annual donation to An Open Hand. Wouldn't it be wonderful to know when you are celebrating your birthday, you are also enabling a child somewhere across the city to celebrate their birthday with their whole family, enabling a day of fun and happy times.

Book Review

The Moth Snowstorm

I could pop in a wee review of Rachel Carson's *Silent Spring* (1962), or Marion Shoard's *The Theft of the Countryside* (1981) about our loss of biodiversity published and read decades ago, but Michael McCarthy's more recent *The Moth Snowstorm* references them. McCarthy's writing shredded my heart the first time I read it – it is so vividly and wondrously written. Other critics have more eloquently described it as full of joy, grief, rage and love for nature.


McCarthy discusses man's relationship with nature after Genesis 1:28, and says we are faced with "a sort of mass cognitive dissonance, a nationwide unawareness of what is obvious" – the terrible environmental price paid for industrialised intensified farming based on monocultures, poisons which have exterminated insects at the base of food chains in the natural world, and landscape scale engineering leading to the sixth mass extinction.

He writes so intensely about butterflies, birdsong, fish, moths, blossom, wildflowers ... and proposes Joy as a defence of the natural world rather than sustainable development or ecosystem services (which assigns monetary value to wilderness and biodiversity).

Another thought carried through the book is in George Monbiot's blurb: "in his beautiful book, Michael McCarthy suggests that a capacity to love the natural world, rather than merely to exist within it, might be a uniquely human trait."

Possibly available in the Oxfam Bookshop in Morningside ... it's where I found my copy!
